



Audiologist (Or/dee/ol/o/jist)

I check ears. If there is something wrong in your ear you may not be able to hear properly, you may get ear ache and sometimes you feel dizzy.



Blood Scientist (Blud/sigh/en/tist)

I test blood to find out what is wrong with a patient. This helps doctors choose the best treatment to make them better.



Care Worker (Cair Wirk/ir)

I help with day-to-day living including washing, dressing and mealtimes.



Dietitian (Digh/e/ti/shun)

I make sure patients get what they need from food even if they are not able to eat normally.



Emergency Call Handler (Ee/mer/jen/si Caul Hand/ler)

**I deal with emergency calls and make
sure people get the help they need as
soon as possible.**





Finance Manager (Fy/nan/s Man/ay/jer)

I look after the money.



General Practitioner (GP) (Jen/ir/rul Prac/ti/shun/ir)

I work at your local doctors' surgery. I treat common illnesses and refer patients to hospitals and other services for urgent or specialised care.





Housing Support Officer (How/sing Su/port O/fi/sir)

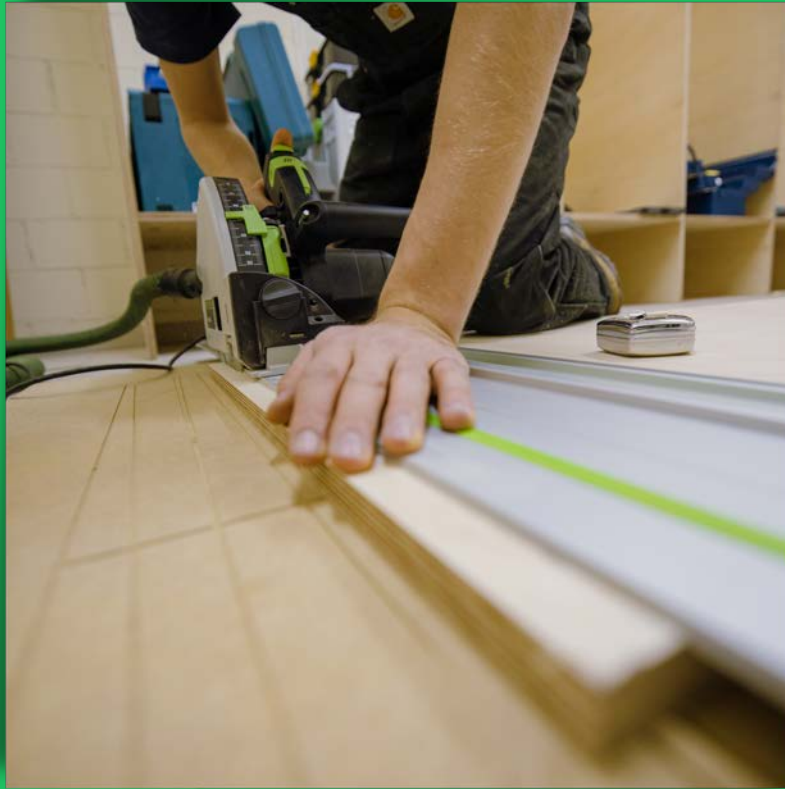
I help people to find and keep somewhere to

I look after and mend the computers.



Joiner (Joy/ner)

I help look after the buildings by making and fixing parts that are made from wood.





Kitchen Assistant (Kit/chen A/sis/tant)

**I work in the kitchen at the hospital
or care home helping to prepare
meals and washing up.**





Laundry Assistant (Lorn/dree A/sis/tant)

I make sure the hospital has lots of clean uniforms and things like sheets and towels for patients.





Midwife (Mid/wigh/f)

**I look after mummies and
their babies before, during and
after the baby is born.**



Nursery Assistant (Nurs/e/ree A/sis/tant)

I work in a nursery looking after babies
and young children.



Occupational Therapist (Oc/yoo/pay/shun/ul The/ra/pist)

I help people to do day-to-day tasks better if they are disabled, injured or poorly. I give them equipment so they can do more for themselves and need less help from their family or care workers.





Podiatrist (Pod/igh/e/trist)

I look after people's feet so that
they can walk better.





Quality Manager (Kwol/i/tee Man/ay/jer)

I help to make sure we are always improving to get better results and better care for patients.





Radiographer (Ray/dee/o/gra/fir)

I use x-rays or other tests to look inside people's bodies to see if they are hurt or poorly.



Social Worker (Soa/shul Wir/kir)

**I protect children and adults from
harm and help improve
independence and wellbeing.**





Theatre Practitioner (Thee/a/tir Prac/ti/shun/ir)

I work in theatres helping to look after patients when they have an operation.



Ultrasonographer (Ul/tru/son/o/gra/fir)

I use sound waves to see if someone is poorly or hurt inside their body. I can even look at babies inside their mummies' tummies to see if they are healthy.



Virologist (Vy/rol/o/jist)

**I am a doctor or scientist. I diagnose,
treat and prevent infections from
viruses.**





Warehouse Manager (Wair/hows Man/ay/jer)

I look after stores and make sure
the hospital wards get all
the supplies they need.



X-ray Assistant (Ex/ray A/sis/tant)

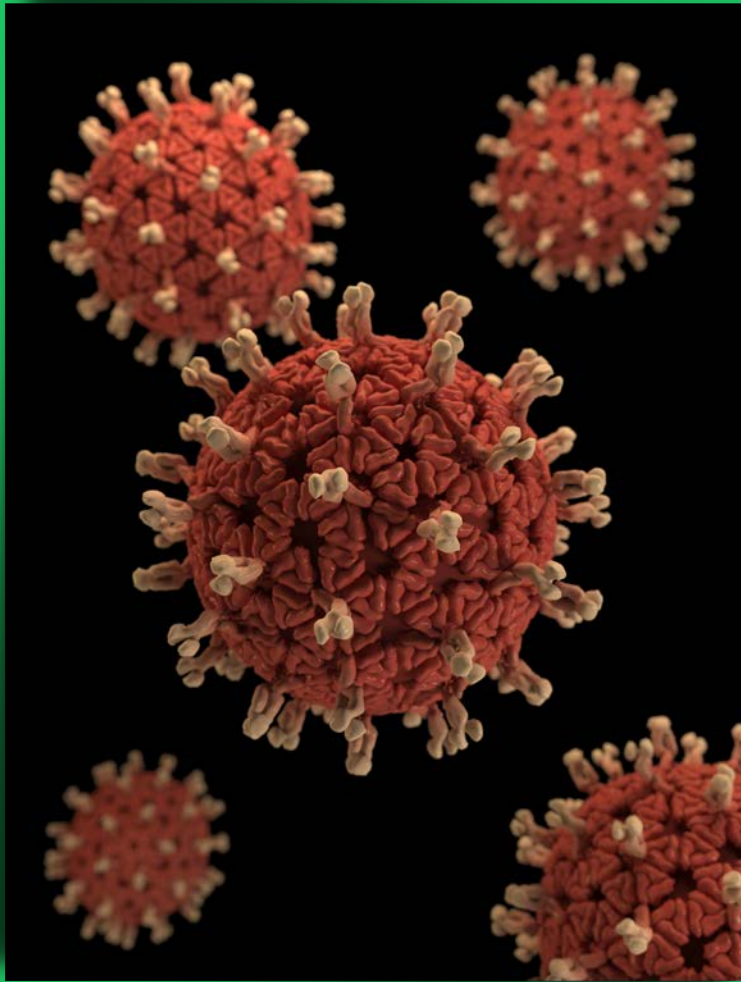
I help the radiographers when they take x-rays to look inside people to see if they are hurt or poorly.

Orthotist (Or/tho/tist)

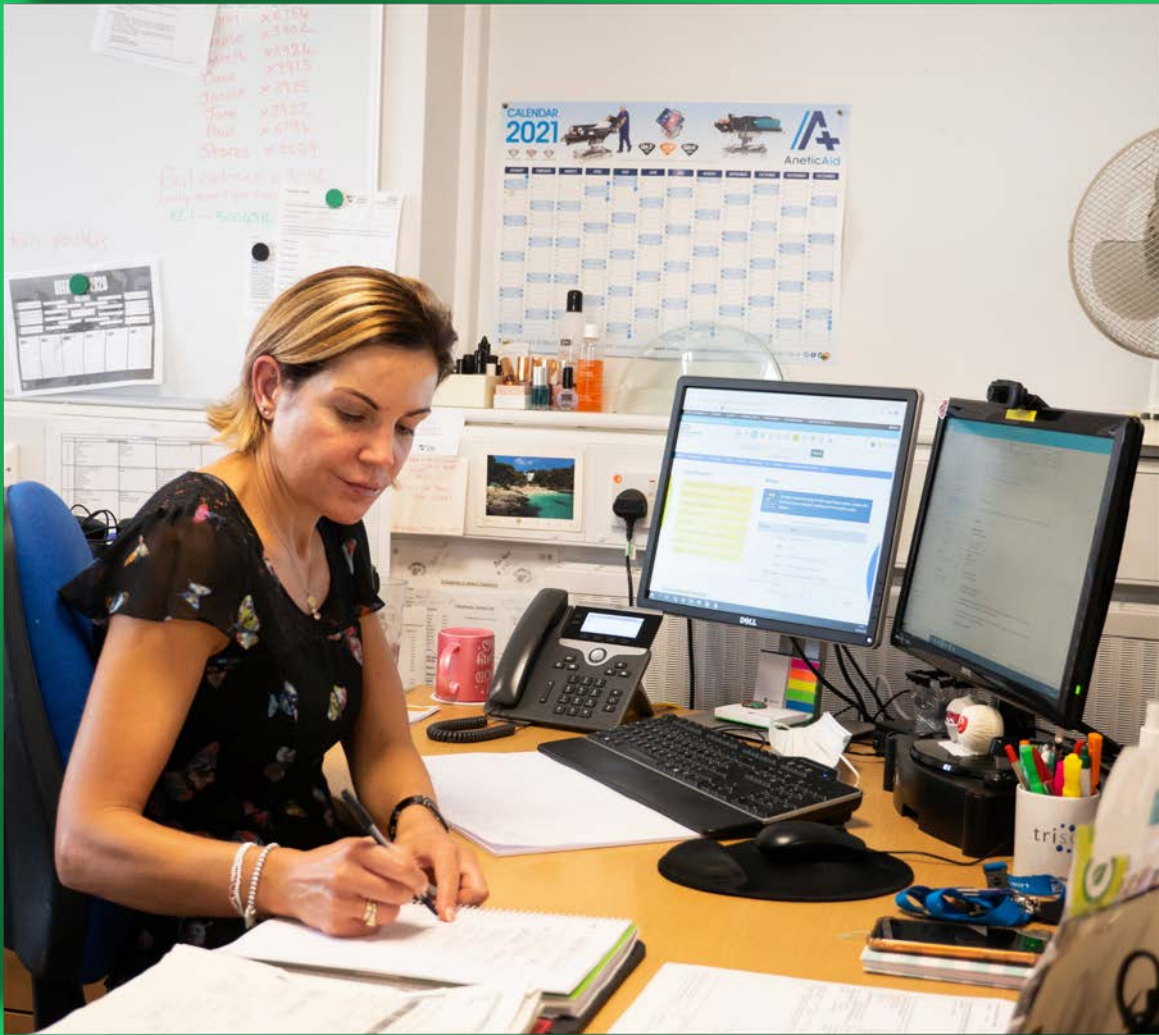
I provide and fit equipment to help people who have problems with their arms or legs.

I look after the buildings and equipment.

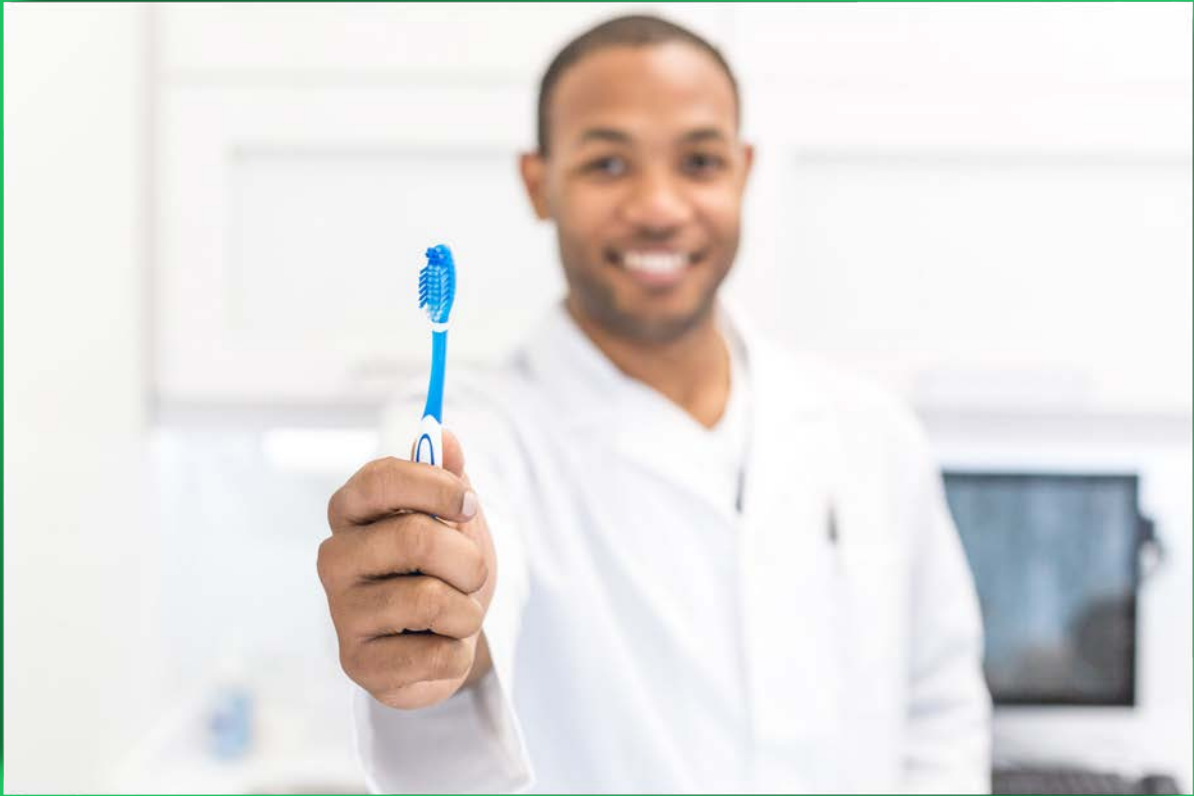




Human Resources (H/yoo/man Re/sor/ses)
